

ABOUT CCRI

The Community College of Rhode Island opened its doors in 1964 with 325 students in a temporary space on Promenade Street in Providence as Rhode Island Junior College. Today, with four campuses throughout the state, CCRI enrolls an average of more than 14,000 credit students each semester, making it the largest comprehensive community college in New England.

Forty percent of its students identify themselves as part of a minority group, many of whom are the first in their families to attend college. Accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, CCRI offers more than 100 degree and certificate programs in the arts, business, computer studies, engineering, health sciences, human services, liberal arts, and science departments taught by faculty who are experts in their field.

Each year, Rhode Islanders fill more than 40,000 seats in our professional development, skill enhancement, job retraining, and noncredit personal enrichment courses offered by CCRI's Division of Workforce Partnerships. CCRI students are active participants in campus life and in the community. The college offers a varsity athletic program with sports and a diverse selection of student clubs and organizations, including student government.

Annually, students, faculty and staff volunteer for a variety of Rhode Island non-profit organizations, making life better for those less fortunate. Since its inception, CCRI has graduated more than 68,000 students, with 95 percent of them living and working in Rhode Island. The college is the No. 1 provider of nurses and other health care workers in the state.

Additionally, more than 1,000 CCRI students per year transfer to Rhode Island College and the University of Rhode Island to continue their education. CCRI's tuition is the most affordable in Rhode Island. A full-time student pays approximately half, or less, the cost of tuition and fees charged at any other college in the state.

According to a recent survey given to exiting students, when graduates were asked, "Would you recommend CCRI to a friend or family member?" nearly 99 percent said yes. By preparing students to continue their education or to enter the state's work force, the Community College of Rhode Island provides its students with the opportunity to change their lives and achieve their dreams.

The CCRI Knight Campus is home to the Vincent A. Cullen Field House with four basketball courts, four tennis courts, three volleyball courts and a fully-equipped weight room. 2021–22 NJCAA ALL-ACADEMIC TEAM

Eight Community College of Rhode Island student-athletes qualified for the 2021–22 National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) All-Academic Team, joining a list of more than 9,000 student-athletes across the country honored for their dedication in the classroom.

Student-athletes are eligible to earn NJCAA academic honors by achieving an overall GPA of 3.60 or higher for the 2020-21 academic year. Three teams are selected based on the cumulative GPA: First Team (4.00 GPA), Second Team (3.80–3.99 GPA), and Third Team (3.60–3.79 GPA).

ATHLETICS AT CCRI

AN OVERVIEW OF CCRI ATHLETICS PAST AND PRESENT

The Community College of Rhode Island is home to one of the Ocean State's finest and most successful intercollegiate athletic programs.

Since its inception in 1965, CCRI has long been considered a front-runner in New England community college and junior college athletic circles. The basketball, baseball, tennis, volleyball, cross country, golf, and soccer teams have all been nationally ranked. The 2002 women's soccer team captured the school's first national championship, while a number of other squads, including men's basketball and women's soccer, were national runners-up.

With more than 5,500 victories, 222 All-Americans, 128 Region XXI championships, and 835 All-Region selections, CCRI leads the way among all New England community colleges.

Great coaching has been the key to CCRI's success. From the athletic department's humble beginnings in 1965, the school has always featured legendary coaches.

With Hall of Fame Athletic Director and men's basketball coach Vin Cullen; baseball coaches Ken Hopkins, Whitey Fell, and Art Pontarelli; tennis coach Ray Carr, and volleyball coach Gail Davis, the tradition of great coaches and top-flight teaching has extended through the years and continues to this day.

The college is also a member of the National Junior College Athletic Association and an associate member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. CCRI fields intercollegiate men's teams in baseball, basketball, and soccer, and intercollegiate women's teams in volleyball, basketball, soccer, and softball.

The Community College of Rhode Island has proven to be a stepping stone for many student athletes who have moved on to complete their academic and athletic careers at four-year colleges and universities throughout the nation.

Since the program started in 1973, men's soccer has won three NJCAA Region XXI championships and amassed an overall record of 426-297-54.

In their first season since the pandemic, the Knights came within one win of their fourth regional title in 2022 under the guidance of head coach Gabe Toro, who enters his 13th season at the helm.

The 2022 team had only one sophomore on the roster, so this year's group will have the benefit of a full season together under its belts.

The Knights compete in Division III. Home games are played at the Flanagan Campus in Lincoln.

First-year head coach Jeff Patten takes over the women's soccer program in 2022 looking to reestablish the tradition of success built in the early 2000s by former coach Dennis Grassini, who led the Knights to two NJCAA Tournament championship game appearances, including a National Title in '02.

Due to the pandemic, the Knights have not fielded a women's soccer team since 2019, a year in which they finished 7-4-1 overall and came within one win of a Region XV/XIX championship.

CCRI's women's soccer program also appeared in the 2003 national championship game, finishing the season as the national runner-up, and won 14 consecutive Region XXI championships between 2001-2014. Since the program's inception in 1994, the Knights have won more than 300 games in addition to producing a number of All-American, All-District, and All-Region players.

The Knights compete in Division III. Home games are played at the Flanagan Campus in Lincoln.

ike most kids who grew up playing baseball, Ben Sears dreamt of one day toeing the rubber at the major-league level pitching in front of thousands of fans on the sport’s biggest stage.

Until the East Providence native transferred to the Community College of Rhode Island in 2019, it was merely just that – a dream.

Three years later, Sears is on his way to Arizona to begin working out at the spring training complex of the Kansas City Royals, who drafted the 22-year-old former CCRI ace and University of Houston closer with the 415th overall pick in this year’s Major League Baseball draft.

While it can take years for draft picks to reach the big leagues, Sears is now one step closer to joining an exclusive list of native Rhode Islanders to play professional baseball, a list that includes the only other major-leaguer from East Providence, Los Angeles Dodgers’ legend Davey Lopes.

“This has all been quite a whirlwind, but in a good way, obviously,” said Sears, who appeared in 17 games for the Knights from 2019–2020. “I’m just excited to get to Arizona and begin the process.”

Sears’ journey to professional baseball has included a number of stops, but he is particularly grateful for his time at CCRI, where he says he first realized playing at the next level was a realistic possibility.

“CCRI is one of the reasons I am where I am today,” said Sears, who transferred to the college for the Spring 2019 semester after spending the fall at Wheaton College in Massachusetts. “Even though I only had one full season, it was one of the best experiences I’ve ever had on the baseball field. I felt like I was selling myself short until I got here. I learned so much on and off the field and it really prepared me to transfer back to a four-year college.

“Playing professionally has always been a dream of mine growing up. Every kid dreams of getting drafted and playing in the big leagues, but it started to become a reality as soon as I got to CCRI that spring. I saw a major improvement in my velocity and overall pitching repertoire and starting drawing interest from professional scouts. I began thinking, ‘This could really happen.’”

Sears was one of three Rhode Islanders selected in this year’s draft and the first former CCRI player since Tom Gavitt in 2014. He also joins more than a dozen former Knights drafted since the program’s inception, which includes the late Rheal Cormier, a veteran

of 16 major-league seasons; and Allen Levrault, who made 56 appearances in three seasons with the Milwaukee Brewers and Florida Marlins between 2000–2003.

At CCRI, Sears was the team’s top starting pitcher, finishing with an 8-2 record in 2019 with a 2.93 ERA and 99 strikeouts in just 67 2/3 innings as the Knights placed fifth in the NJCAA Division III College World Series. His 2020 season was cut short after just seven games due to the COVID-19 pandemic, at which point Sears had already struck out 23 batters in 11 1/3 innings. In his final appearance for CCRI, Sears pitched a one-hit, complete-game shutout with 15 strikeouts against Vermillion Community College.

The tall, hard-throwing righty who always dreamt of playing in the big leagues has a shot to become the next Rhode Islander to proudly represent the Ocean State.

The Knights return to the court in 2022 looking to win their second consecutive Region XXI championship after capturing the title last season for the first time since 2016. CCRI also came within one victory of an NJCAA Tournament appearance.

The team's key to success is the steady guidance of Patrick Chin, who enters his fourth season in 2022. Despite an entirely new roster stemming from the pandemic layover, Chin's team posted its second consecutive winning season in 2021; overall, the Knights have finished with a winning record five times in the last six years dating back to 2015.

The Knights compete in Division III. Home games are played at the Flanagan Campus in Lincoln.

- Entered the Region XXI Tournament as the No. 2 seed and defeated top-seeded Massasoit to win the championship

CCRI Hall of Famer and Class of 1989 alumnus Doug Haynes continues to make an impact as he enters his fourth year as head coach.

The 2021-22 season was his best yet as the Knights finished 17-7 overall, won the Region XXI championship as the tournament's No. 1 seed, and advanced to the NJCAA Division III Women's Basketball Tournament for the first time since 2013.

As the tournament's 10th seed, the Knights ended their season on a high note by beating sixth-seeded Rock Valley College in the consolation round. Winning the Region XXI championship capped a remarkable turnaround for the women's program, which won just six games in 2019-20 in Haynes' second year at the helm. The Knights compete in Division III. Home games are played at the Knight Campus in Warwick.

- Won 17 games after finishing with only six victories in 2019-20
- Had all five starters earn All-Region XXI honors, led by first-team selection Maggie Schwab
- Finished with their most overall victories since the 2012-13 season

Another banner year for the men's basketball program ended with a 23-5 record, another Region XXI championship, and a return trip to the NJCAA Division III Men's Basketball Tournament.

Led by rebounding record-setters Theonoah Jadotte and NJCAA First Team All-American Mitchel Noresca, the Knights won their second consecutive regional title as the tournament's No. 1 seed and earned the No. 3 seed at the NJCAAs, where they finished sixth overall.

Marcus Douthit, a former Providence College standout who joined CCRI in 2019-20 as an assistant, will begin the upcoming season as the men's interim head coach in place of Rick Harris, who parted ways with the college after 15 seasons. The Knights compete in Division III. Home games are played at the Knight Campus in Warwick.

The Knights finished 8-17 in 2022 as they continue to rebuild under the direction of second-year coach Paul Mercier, who previously served as an assistant for the 2020 team whose season was canceled after only a handful of games due to the pandemic.

Last year also marked the Knights' first season at the Division III level. Starting from scratch, the Knights fielded an entire roster of freshmen last year and played their best in April and May toward the end of the season.

Since its inception in 1980, the softball program has won 451 games and 12 Region XXI championships. Home games are played at Winslow Field in Warwick.

2022 highlights

- Strong stretch in mid-April with five wins in seven games
- Scored 95 runs and went 6-4 during red-hot stretch offensively in April
- Led offensively by Jillian Serra and Hanna Dias, who each batted above .500 and combined for 46 RBI
- Dias finished top 10 in the NJCAA and No. 1 on the team with 27 stolen bases


In what was supposed to be a rebuilding year under first-year head coach Joe Hopkins, the Knights ended their season with a deep run in the Region XXI Tournament and came within two wins of back-to-back titles.

The Knights finished 12-22 overall and won a pair of games in the consolation bracket of the regional tournament to advance to the finals, where their season ultimately ended at the hands of No. 3 nationally-ranked Northern Essex Community College.

The baseball program's rich history includes five trips to the NJCAA Division III College World Series, most recently in 2019 when the team finished 27-12 overall. The Knights compete in Division III. Home games are played at the Knight Campus.

2022 highlights

- Five members earned All-NJCAA Region XXI honors
- Sophomore Tyler Monahan won the team's triple crown by finishing first in batting average, home runs, and RBI
- Won four of six games in mid-April against strong regional competition
- Pitcher Caleb Harris led the team with a 4.55 ERA and finished 1-1 in eight appearances

This year is the 20th anniversary of the historic 2002 CCRI women's soccer team, which finished a perfect 22-0 and captured the school's first championship in any sport with a 3-2 win over Monroe Community College in the finals of the National Junior College

Athletic Association (NJCAA) Tournament. The 2002 team boasted five All-Americans and six All-New England selections in addition to setting schools records for most wins in a season (22) and most goals scored (125).

"It was a special group, and you just don't come across that all the time. It's something we'll never forget. I know it's been a long time, but it still sits with you," said former head coach Dennis Grassini, who was in his third year at the helm in 2002. "That group was very competitive, even against each other, even in practice. They pushed one another."

Two-time All-American Katie Leahy '03 of Warwick, a freshman on the 2002 team, scored 54 goals that year and set a school record with 94 in two seasons at CCRI. She also earned NJCAA Tournament offensive MVP honors in both years and is the school's all-time leading scorer.

"I tell everybody CCRI was the best years of my life. The soccer was just the start of it," Leahy said. "If CCRI was four years, I would've been there every year. I loved it."

Warwick native Stacey Norcross '02, one of only six sophomores in 2002, never imagined the Knights could achieve such remarkable success that year.

"We all had our positives and negatives, but it meshed," Norcross said. "Fifteen years later, you feel old, but when you go back to that day and, even though it was a junior college, that was absolutely the best time of my life, by far."

West Warwick native Alyson St. Amand '02 took on a leadership role with her composure and experience under pressure helping guide a predominantly young team to a national title.

"I, personally, was nervous, but as the captain, I couldn't show that," St. Amand said. "We kind of just took it day by day, hour by hour. We wanted to prove people wrong, that even though we're a community college from Rhode Island, we still have fight in us. We all did our job. I loved my experience at CCRI. I wouldn't trade it for anything."




