Develop Your R-Plan Assignment in 5 Steps

Step 1: Determine how students will know that the R-Plan assignment has been given.

- Will you email or send an announcement through Blackboard Learn?
- If you'll email, how will you get the students' contact information?
- What will your syllabus say about your R-Plan assignment?

Step 2: Choose your assignment.

- What's a lesson you wish you had time to cover, but doesn't fit in your semester?
- Will they write, research, reflection or create a presentation?

Example of Assignments:

Read and Reflect. Students read or watch something and write a reflection or answer a discussion prompt about it.

Presentations. Students create a group or individual "presentations" which they share online. Peers reply, comment and discuss.

Data Collection & Analysis. Students collect and analyze relevant data through a scheme you propose or they devise. They publish the data and analysis online, then discuss & comment in Blackboard.

News Analysis. Students research current events online, share links and analyze the events and the contemporary analysis.

Step 3: Determine if students will work alone or collaborate.
