# President's Report



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# A Message from Rosemary Costigan

To the Council on Postsecondary Education,

I am pleased to present the October President's Report from the Community College of Rhode Island.

I am very proud to share that the New England Council of Higher Education (NECHE) has officially reaffirmed CCRI's accreditation. This important recognition speaks volumes about the college's collective commitment to excellence, student success, assessment, and continuous improvement.

In its letter affirming accreditation, the Commission commended the college's "candid, thorough, and well-written self-study." The letter went on to read, "With its committed and caring leadership, energized and engaged faculty, staff, and student body, the Community College of Rhode Island is well-positioned to

continue to offer 'high school graduates and returning adults the opportunity to acquire the knowledge and skills necessary for intellectual, professional and personal growth through an array of academic, career, and lifelong learning programs' well into the future."

The NECHE Commission did not find any concerns that would require a two-year follow-up, making the next comprehensive evaluation in Spring 2034, with a standard five-year interim report due in 2029.

This reaffirmation reflects the dedication, hard work and unwavering commitment of the entire CCRI community. The Commission's findings highlight the positive impact that each of my colleagues has on our students and on the future of the college - this achievement is a shared one.

The Commission was particularly impressed with the launch of CCRI Advantage to support incoming students who would benefit from additional preparation in college-level reading, writing, math, and success skills.

CCRI Advantage is proving to be truly transformative in how we prepare students for the rigors of college coursework. Not only has retention been fantastic, but the feedback from both students and faculty has been outstanding. In the coming weeks, I look forward to sharing further updates with this Council on this innovative approach to student success.

Earlier this month, we officially cut the ribbon on our Casino Training Academy, sponsored by Bally's, and launched our first Bally's-sponsored workforce training program, Introduction to Dealer Training. This is the first of many new certificate and degree programs we will be building out as a result of Bally's \$5-million-dollar gift to the college. This partnership truly highlights the critical role community colleges play in boosting a region's economy, and we look forward to continuing to support Bally's workforce needs and ensure Rhode Island is at the forefront of growing industries.

The success of CCRI Advantage and our Bally's partnership as a result of philanthropic giving stand as proof of the power of philanthropy to support the critical role community colleges play in the higher education landscape. Last month, The Providence Journal published an editorial in which I discussed the great impact of philanthropy on ensuring that community colleges can continue to embrace innovation to fulfill our mission of providing accessible, high-quality education for all.

In further news from the Division of Workforce Partnerships, this past Wednesday, we welcomed Congressman Gabe Amo to our Flanagan Campus to participate in a GWO offshore wind safety training demo. CCRI is proud to be a leader in Rhode Island's blue economy, including as home to the state's first-ever and only GWO-certified training facility, and I am grateful to our congressional delegation for its continued support of our college.

I would also like to express my gratitude to Senators Jack Reed and Sheldon Whitehouse, who commemorated the college's 60th birthday with an official recognition on the Senate floor, citing CCRI as "a pillar of hope for the community, consistently rising to the challenge of meeting the educational and workforce needs of the present and future."

As we celebrate our 60th year throughout this year, I am also pleased to share that CCRI alumna, Jennie Johnson, will be transitioning to a new role as Interim Associate Vice President for Institutional Advancement and College Relations and Executive Director of the CCRI Foundation. Jennie's deep connection to CCRI has shaped her dedication to the mission of the college and makes her a natural fit for this leadership role. Her strong communication skills and track record of building positive relationships will be invaluable as we continue to expand the Foundation's impact during our 60th anniversary.

In partnership with the CCRI Foundation, last week, the college hosted the 2024 Outstanding Alumni Awards, where we honored nine alumni, spanning 40 years of CCRI history, for their contributions to our community and leadership in their chosen fields. We were joined by faculty, staff, alumni and community leaders, including Governor Dan McKee, Lieutenant Governor Sabina Matos, and alumni members

of our 60th Anniversary Honorary Committee: Senator Leonidas Raptakis, Senator John Burke and Representative Thomas Noret. It was an incredibly moving ceremony, and as a previous honoree myself, I was especially touched to play a role in celebrating these incredible alumni.

Lastly, I would like to share that on October 26, we will be holding our Fall Open House from 10am-1pm on the Knight Campus. This is one of our biggest events of the year and is expected to draw hundreds of prospective students. Our last in-person open house in April drew a record-breaking crowd of more than 400 prospective students. I would like to extend the invitation to all members of the Council to join us for our Fall Open House.

In closing, I express my sincere gratitude to the Council for your leadership and ongoing support of CCRI and our students. I look forward to continuing to work together on behalf of academic excellence, equity, and access to higher education for all Rhode Islanders.



## **ENROLLMENT**


## Overall Fall Enrollment: Full-time vs. Part-time Distribution



The college's Career Services and Business and Professional Studies departments are hosting its annual Business Career Fair on October 22 on the Warwick Knight Campus. 




### On the Record

# **Building Bridges:** Fair Chance Hiring summit

The Division of Workforce Partnerships hosted its second "Building Bridges" workforce summit of the semester at the Warwick Knight Campus. Entitled "Fair Chance Hiring Summit – Leveraging Fair Chance Hiring for a More Inclusive Rhode Island Workforce," the summit focused on the practice of fair chance hiring, providing meaningful work opportunities for Rhode Islanders who are justice-impacted.

In Rhode Island, nearly one in three individuals have a criminal record. For these individuals, their past can create overwhelming barriers when they try to rebuild their lives—particularly when seeking employment. Too many find themselves locked out of opportunities for economic advancement, no matter how qualified or driven they may be. This cycle of exclusion doesn't just affect them; it impacts their families and weakens our economy and communities.

At CCRI, we understand that education and workforce training are key to breaking this cycle. Our college has a proud history of providing high-quality educational opportunities to justice-involved individuals, and we remain dedicated to providing a career and education pathway, regardless of someone's background.







## **Three-Peat**

CCRI has been honored with a Manufacturing Award by the **Providence Business News** (**PBN**) for the third consecutive year, a testament to its sustained excellence in workforce development and education in the manufacturing sector. CCRI's innovative approach to training the next generation of skilled workers has been recognized across different award categories.

as PBN's Excellence in Workforce Development and Productivity for the Process Technology program in 2024. This award marks the third year in a row the college has been identified with previous honors in 2022 for the Fast Track to CNC program, and in 2023 for the college's partnership and programming with Electric Boat. The college just started its 15th cohort of the Process Tech program which has served over 150 students and has placed its graduates with over 40 employers, at an average starting salary of over \$47,000.



# On the Horizon

## Workday Launch Date: March 2025

Rhode Island's ERP (Enterprise Resource Planning) Workday system is a comprehensive, cloud-based software platform that integrates key functions of state government operations, such as human resources (HR), payroll, finance, and other administrative tasks. All state agencies, including CCRI, are transitioning to Workday as part of a broader effort to modernize and streamline these processes across various agencies and departments.



CCRI's cross-divisional Workday team include members of Finance, FR and Information Technology, began testing the system internally on October 16 to assess progress, identify issues, and make recommendations to plans as needed.
