## **Course Description**

This program is designed for high school students, ages 15 years and 10 months through 21 years. Successful completion of this course earns a certificate that students may present to the DMV for a Drivers Permit.

### **Course Objectives**

The driver education program is your first step in meeting the requirements necessary to obtain your driver's license in the State of Rhode Island. The class's main objective is to help you develop a positive and mature attitude towards driving an automobile. It is important to note that the mere accumulation of facts relative to driving a car, although important, is worthless unless you can effectively apply what you have learned to a real driving situation. To ensure that you get the maximum out of the course, the following rules will be in effect.

# Upon successful completion of this course, the student will have developed an awareness and be able to:

- Describe the magnitude of and consequences related to the traffic problem
- Acknowledge that most collisions/crashes are caused by preventable mistakes committed by all drivers involved.
- Learn the tasks to be performed in the operation of a motor vehicle
- Acknowledge one's personal responsibility for safe operation of a motor vehicle
- Improve driving behavior and attitudes based on information that many drivers lack.

## Students will accept that:

- Traffic crashes and congestion constitute a serious social/economic problem
- Safe driving is a matter of managing risk through management of visibility, time, and space within the limits of available traction
- The purpose of this course is to develop knowledgeable, responsible, risk-reducing, collision-free drivers, who can better assess and manage risk
- Adjustments in driving behavior are necessary to compensate for psycho-physical conditions/factors that can lead to inappropriate driver actions

## Evaluation

You must pass two final examinations covering all nineteen chapters of the How to Drive textbook and the State Permit Test covering the State Driver's Manual. You must earn a grade of 70% or better on both the final course examination and the Rhode Island DMV Knowledge Exam (Permit Test) to pass the course. Students who pass the course but fail the State of Rhode Island Knowledge Exam can retake the test at the Division of Motor Vehicles for a fee. A new CCRI Certificate of Completion must be presented at the RI DMV.

## **Driver Education Student/Parent Agreement**

The Driver Education program is your first step in meeting the requirements necessary to obtain your driver's license in the State of Rhode Island, per RIGLS 31-10-19. The class's main objective is to help you develop a positive and mature attitude towards driving an automobile. It is important to note that the mere accumulation of facts relative to driving a car, although important, is worthless unless you can effectively apply what you have learned to a real driving situation. To ensure that you get the maximum out of the course, the following rules will be in effect.

To be eligible to take the DMV Knowledge Exam (Permit test), you must complete the class requirements as outlined by the instructor. Requirements can include attendance, participation, homework, quizzes, and tests. Students who fail the class must take the class over. Students who pass the class but fail the DMV Knowledge Exam can retake the exam at the Cranston DMV by appointment.

#### Materials

You are required to purchase the AAA, How to Drive, 15<sup>th</sup> Edition textbook/eBook, and have it with you each class. See the CCRI website for more information. Make certain that you have a pencil/pen and notepaper.

#### Attendance

Rhode Island State Law requires that you complete with a satisfactory grade & thirty-three (33) hours of Driver Education. You must be on time for every class session. If you are late, you will have to make up the time missed after the course has ended. Excused absences under 6 hours can be made up in the next scheduled makeup class, after the course has ended. Absences over 6 hours or more will result in being removed from the class and forfeiture of the course fee.

#### Assignments

All assignments must be handed in when due, unless otherwise agreed upon with your instructor. You must do your homework at home, not in class. Credit <u>may</u> not be given for late assignments. You must come to class prepared to work and be attentive.

#### **Electronic Communication Device Policy**

Students are NOT permitted to utilize their electronic devices—including earbuds, smart watches, and cell phones during class. This includes making or receiving calls, video chats/recordings, text messaging, checking text messages, checking e-mails, drafting e-mails, "surfing" the web and/or all related activities during class.

Turn off your electronic devices during class. For emergency use of your cell phone during class, contact the instructor BEFORE class begins and change phone mode to silence.

#### Other Course/Behavior Expectations

• Food, drink, or gum chewing may not be allowed in some buildings. Please keep your space clean.

• Talking during a test or any indication of copying a classmate's homework or test will result in being removed from the class.

• Sleeping during class is not allowed and will result in immediate removal and require the time to be made up.
